CONGREGATIONAL REPORTS


Pastor's Report

2022 was a year of the Holy Spirit in so many ways as we found God's Spirit around almost every corner. Turn the pages of this report to see just how the Holy Spirit is bearing fruit in and through Church of the Cross in so many different ways, events, and people.

During Lent we studied Joan Gray's book <u>Sailboat Church</u>, which drew us into a deeper awareness of the power of the Holy Spirit in our lives. Creating our own 'boats' we had a visual reminder to raise our sails and set our attention on the Holy Spirit. To which, we discovered new life within us just waiting to unfold for God's kingdom. During this study, like the Psalmist, we prayed, *"Teach us to do your will, for you are* our *God. Let your good spirit lead* us *on a level path."* (Psalm 143:10-adapted for the community)

With refreshed eyes and renewed spirits, we began looking around in new ways, and here are just a few things which unfolded this year:

- A "Winter Warmth Event" in January when clothing was provided to many families. (See Micah Report)
- Recognizing our community's need to heal from the pandemic and share our gratitude for all who provided for us during the pandemic, we held an interfaith COVD Remembrance Vigil to remember the deceased and express our gratitude. We are grateful to Leslie Michaels for painting the Peace Mural on our gym wall. (See Worship Report)
- A wonderful outpouring of volunteers who worked during the Spring Clean-up for our facility.











- As you see in the Worship Team Report (and the sanctuary), the Holy Spirit essentially dropped a baby grand piano into our sanctuary, via Dr Robert Kania and donor Mally Micelli, that is. The surprise and joy of this gift delights us every Sunday!
- We were once again able to travel to Sisseton, SD on a mission trip. While it was a much smaller Vacation Bible School (VBS) than pre-covid, the intent of the mission has turned its focus to helping local

Report of Clerk of Session

The Church of the Cross Session is the governing body of the congregation and functions in compliance with the Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church, USA and COTC's bylaws in all its actions. The bylaws provide for nine elders to be elected by the congregation. Elders are normally elected to three-year terms and may not serve more than two consecutive terms (6 years) but may be re-elected after at least one year has passed.

Deacons Report

The deep generosity of our congregation allowed us to provide support to the following:

- Direct assistance requests 12 individual requests totaling \$2,310.49.
- "Souper Bowl" Sunday took place and \$321 was donated to the Schaumburg Food Pantry through donations sent to the church office.
- Aldi's cards provided food during the Easter season. We were able to provide 48 cards at \$40 each family in need at Lakeview Elementary School = \$1,900
- Easter flowers were sold online and provided beauty to our sanctuary for the Easter service. **Proceeds from the 2021 Christmas poinsettias and 2022 Easter**



flowers allowed us to purchase 20 Walmart cards at \$25 each (total=\$500) which were shared with our veterans through Joe Palmer of We Who Serve.

- Aldi's cards provided food to needy families at Lakeview Elementary during the Christmas season. We were able to provide 60 cards at \$45 each = \$2,655
- Warm Coats donated to Lakeview Elementary children for a total of \$1,848

We celebrated Palm Sunday on Sunday, April 10th with a Potluck brunch in the COTC lounge.





We celebrated getting outside again with our community when we participated in the National Night Out on Tuesday, October 4th. In conjunction with the Hoffman Estates Police and Fire departments, and other community businesses, we filled our parking lot with friends and neighbors and celebrated being together once again out in the great outdoors. Hot dogs and chips, cookies, and soft drinks were served and enjoyed by all.

Worship Team Report

The AV Team that projects and streams worship services consisted of John Baker, Jim Moorman, Mike Lorentz, and Stu Truelsen.

This was a most unusual year that included Christmas day falling on a Sunday. The next time that will happen is the year 2033. In addition to our traditional candlelight service on Christmas Eve at 7 p.m., we returned on Sunday for a Christmas Day service. The sanctuary never looks better than during Advent with an array of Poinsettias, the Christmas tree with Christmon ornaments, candles, ivy, and other decorations.

We planned a Christmas Sabbath on December 23, that never took place because of blizzard warnings and extreme cold. The idea was to open the sanctuary all day and through early evening for prayer and meditation. Our flyer asked the question--Need a moment to rest in awe of the Christ Child? Church officers were scheduled to be available on two hour shifts to pray with anyone who asked. Christmas Sabbath was going to be a respite from the hustle and bustle of Christmas shopping. As it was, the storm ended most of the running around for everyone.

Throughout 2022 we adjusted the worship service because of the lingering COVID pandemic and its new variants. At times this meant wearing our masks, but we ended the year with optional wearing of masks. Other precautions included extra spacing in the pews, communion taken in the pews with pre-filled cups and wafers, and finally hybrid communion with the option to remain seated or be served the bread and wine at the front of the communion table. Many of our congregation did in fact get COVID during 2022, but the symptoms were tolerable. Of course, we continued to stream our worship services for all those unable to attend in person, and on various Sundays Cheryl Wilkins added a Spanish reading of scripture.

The <u>Sailboat Church</u> study prompted us to leave our comfort zone and listen for the Holy Spirit to direct us as a church. We certainly did that with the COVID Remembrance Vigil on

May 25, a Thursday evening. It was an interfaith gathering in the gym to remember beloved families, friends, colleagues, and neighbors lost to COVID. Faith and community leaders participated in the service. Candles were lit by those in attendance, and a tree was donated and planted by the Keppel family as a



memorial. A beautiful peace mural was painted on a portion of the gym wall by Leslie Michaels.

Being guided by the Holy Spirit means to expect the unexpected. What could be more unexpected than the gift of a baby grand piano, which now occupies a place near the front of the sanctuary. The piano was donated by Mally Micelli, the creative thought behind the Elgin Messiah Sing-along. She and Dr. Robert Kania worked together on the sing along. Several members of our choir participated in the sing-along and got to thank Mally in person. Robert alternates between the grand piano downstairs and the organ and digital piano upstairs. The choir also has been singing around the new piano on occasion. It's

always nice to have the choir sing where we can see them.

Another way in which we were led by the Holy Spirit was by sponsoring a non-traditional, interfaith worship service geared toward the 12-step recovery community. Led by Jim Buchholz, the service is an experiment to determine whether there is a need and interest in this community of unchurched seekers for this type of worship. A commitment was made to meet once monthly for six months. The group met three times during 2022 and grew from an initial 12 to 21 on New Year's Eve.

Worship at Church of the Cross is so meaningful to all of us. We are blessed to be led in worship by Pastor Julie. We are blessed to have faithful choir members led by Marie and Robert's splendid accompaniment. As our outdoor sign said right after Christmas, "Comfort and Joy Found Here."

How very true.

The Micah team seeks to support the congregation as COTC does God's work as we best understand God's will, by doing justice loving kindness and walking humbly with God.

Members: Ken Groenewold, Laura De La Cruz, Jeff Peterson, Rev. Julie Peterson, Judie Truelsen, and Cathy Walker

We see social justice as love applied to systems, policies, cultures, and individuals. Our primary desire is to focus on racial justice, to be open and affirming to LGBTQ+ persons, and to support immigrants and refugees.

The Micah team seeks out and evaluates opportunities for the church as a whole to serve others. When we find an opportunity, we make recommendations to the session which then decides which opportunities to accept. 2022 was our first complete year in service. Several items implemented this year are listed below:

- In January COTC held a "Winter Warmth Event". Clothing was provided to many families. This was done in conjunction with Partners for Our Community (POC), Christ Church in Hanover Park, and The Rotary Club of Schaumburg, Hoffman Estates.
- In February, in honor of **black history month**; We made a presentation to the congregation regarding the DuSable Museum of African American History.
- During the summer, in conjunction with POC, we were able to provide furniture and bicycles to immigrant families.
- We reviewed and recommended the "Being Mortal—End of Life Series" which was open not only to our church members but also to all members of the community.
- We reviewed and recommended a program which was initiated and implemented by Jim Buchholz. The program is named "Community for Conscious Contact."
- In the fall we explored the possibility of a clothes closet at COTC. We met with Elk Grove Presbyterian Church which already had a community clothes closet and a food pantry. Based on this work, we planted the seed that bloomed as our ongoing program "*Lilies of the Field* **Community Clothes Closet.**" Knowing we need additional volunteers; we continue to be tremendously grateful for our COTC volunteers even as we spread the word into the community to assist us in this vital work.
- We applied for and received a grant of \$5,000 from the Chicago Presbytery to support the clothes closet.
- For 2022, \$5,000 was budgeted for unspecified items. During the year, \$1,000 was used to match contributions for the people of Ukraine and \$4,000 was used to support the startup of *Lilies of the Field* Community Clothes Closet.

We communicate with the Village of Hoffman Estates, POC, the Kenneth Young Center, other churches, and non-profit organizations to seek new opportunities and to communicate what is being done at COTC.

Lilies of the Field Community Clothes Closet

Coordinators: Jane Lesch, Judie Truelsen, Laura De La Cruz. Volunteers: Sue Liautaud, Ann Moorman, Cathy Walker, and many more!

The concept of the COTC running a clothing closet began in the Micah Group in 2021.

Through discussion, discernment, and prayers, the decision was made to open the closet. There was a lot of cleaning and rearranging to create the space and with a lot of hard work by a lot of volunteers the closet was opened on Nov. 8, 2022. Since that day the closet has provided clothing for 19 people and their families by providing them about 600 items in addition to supplying some coats, hats, and gloves for Lakeview School children.

The clothing closet provides gently used or new clothing to our patrons free of charge. The closet relies on donations of gently used clothing and monetary donations from our congregation and our community. We also requested and received a \$5,000 grant from the Presbytery for the closet's needs. There will always be a monetary need as we will need to buy new underwear and socks.

Currently our hours are:

- Tuesdays: 11 am 1 pm
- Thursdays: 4 6 pm
- The first and third Saturday of the month: 9 11 am

Plans in December were underway for an event being put on by the Kenneth Young Organization as they bring a large group of immigrants to COTC for a day in early January 2023. (2023 Note: 139 people from 39 families were able to receive close to 830 items.)

I'd like to thank everyone who has volunteered their time to help get the closet up and running. I am overwhelmed by the willingness of the whole congregation to pitch in and help with this

project. The only way this project will continue successfully is if we can keep up the support of the congregation and get more support from our community. We ask that everyone keep talking about the closet with their friends and relatives and encouraging donations and volunteering.

CORPORATION REPORTS

Corporation Team Report

Members: Jim Letterer, President; Jim Vakoc, Vice-President; Ken Groenewold, Treasurer; Pat Groenewold, Secretary; Terry Maulding, congregation member; Hank Morgan, congregational member; and Rev. Julie Peterson.

Corporate Operations (Corp Ops) meets monthly and as needed for emergencies. This team is responsible for the church's budget and finances; building and grounds; other administrative matters; and personnel matters. Following is a summary of major activities and accomplishments during 2022 in each of these areas:

Budget and Finance

- Monthly review of financial reports, statement of funds, general fund income and expenses, investment balances and making recommendations to session on financial decisions as required.
- Annual update of signing authority on bank and investment accounts
- Summary financial information presented to the congregation periodically.
- Transfer cash from investments to general fund with session approval as needed for operations.
- Recommendations to session for 2023 budget, including salary increases for staff.
- Periodically meet and consult with external investment advisor.
- Additional financial details are provided in the treasurer's report in the Annual Report document.

Building and Grounds

- Oversight of regular maintenance and repairs to the building with outstanding support from Jim Vakoc for indoor items and Charlie Keppel for outdoor work
- Management of use of COTC facilities by other organizations, including fee rates, agreements, compliance with insurance and child protections policies, and reviewing new usage requests
- The refurbishing of the old nursery space into a Gathering Room, with nursery space at the back of the room was completed with wired internet access to make streaming and virtual meetings more dependable.
- GE replacement refrigerator for \$899 was purchased for the downstairs kitchen and charged to the Major Maintenance account.
- Secured chairs to replace older, broken ones.
- Supported various workday projects both in the building and on the exterior.

Other Administrative Responsibilities

• Review and execute contracts including heating / air-conditioning, insurance, lawn maintenance, snow plowing, and fire safety.

Personnel

- Pastor Julie has a number of action items for Corp Ops each month, including the ongoing discussion of how wonderful it is to have such a great COTC staff!
- Coordinate annual review for the pastor.
- Review and revise job descriptions as needed.

A big **thank you** to Ken, Pat, Terry, Hank, Jim V, and Pastor Julie for all their hard work on Corp Ops in 2022!
